

Scanner apps such as Enigma and QR Code Scanner are particularly useful in museums and art galleries which may be crowded, making it difficult to read the written details about the exhibitions.



You can stand back and read about the exhibitions on your own phone or tablet and retain the information to review it later.





Flight+

Flight+ allows you to track all available flights worldwide in real-time, and display them on an intuitive interface.

Flyer rights

Flyer rights tells you what the carrier legally owes you (if you're in the -United States).

When you're bumped from a domestic flight and arrive at your destination more than two hours late, for instance, the app will tell you that you're owed 400 percent of the one-way fare (up to \$1.300).

Most of the information can be accessed without Wi-Fi, making the app easy to check when you're stuck on the tarmac or at baggage claim, but there's also a collection of links to airline rules that would be hard to find if you were searching for them on a computer.



The Entertainer

The Entertainer covers 23 cities so far, with more to come, and highlights places near your location that offer buy-one-get-one-free discounts.

Users just have to show the app and redeem the coupon when they're at the location.

Fodor's City Guides is a great way to check out the culture around you. Read up on popular landmarks and attractions. And who doesn't like looking at amazing images?



GateGuru

Kirsten Alana writes:

GateGuru is the only thing that's gotten me through some really long airport layovers.

It helps me find anything I would need at any airport no matter my length of stay from a chapel to a shower facility to a specific shop or type of cuisine.

The airport maps are fabulous.

Maggie Cooper writes:

Before I travel I usually look for apps for each airport that can help me streamline transfers, particularly if I have a tight connection to make.

Having a map of terminals can save a lot of time when you are doing the Run of Shame!

I've also recently downloaded GateGuru which has a database of worldwide airport information, including maps, but I've yet to have a chance to check it out on the fly.



Foodspotting

Ben Bowers writes:

The Foodspotting app is powered by users' own reviews and images.

For each city, users can browse the app's selections alphabetically, by category, rank and neighborhood.



Forevermap

Forevermap allows you to download maps of your destination country before travelling, avoiding data roaming costs.



FourSquare

FourSquare is a location-based app that highlights places to eat.



Google earth

Gas Buddy

Google Goggles

Google Goggles enables you to direct your phone's camera at a building and, as long as it is well known enough, the app will provide relevant Wikipedia articles on it.



Garmin BlueChart

Simon Locke writes:

The Garmin BlueChart app itself is free but regional charts of navigable water are available for various regions of the world at costs ranging from \$30 to \$120.

A phenomenal program for the international sailor. A free add-on to this charting software is ActiveCaptain that provides detailed information about marinas, anchorages, points of interest etc.



Google Maps

Judith Fein writes:

I use Google Maps all the time. I love the talking feature, so I can keep my eyes on the road instead of my iPhone.

Even though Google seems determined to make Google Maps less useful for travellers with each new release by crippling the offline caching functions, it's still an app I use every day on the road.





Google Translate

Unlike the Maps product, Google has actually made Google Translate more useful recently with the addition of downloadable language packs (on Android).

Now I don't even need a data connection to translate the world around me (although there are many more options when I am connected).



HopStop

HopStop allows one to chart out public transportation, walking and driving directions for a number of major US cities and a smattering of global cities.

Also can save maps for offline viewing.



Hostelworld offers a geo-tagged directory of 25,000 listings for budget hotels and access to over 3.5 million user reviews.



Glympse

Glympse provides friends with your exact, real-time location so they know where you are.

Simply just enter in the destination, and choose who you want to share Glympse with, and it sends a text message to that person where they can view your location on a map, as well as see your ETA.



Hotelpal

HotelPal uses the iPhone's GPS functionality to show all the hotels around you.

It also allows users to view rates after inputting their desired length of stay, see pictures of the hotel in question and view a compatible list of the hotel amenities.



Groopic

Groopic is a great app (\$1.99US) that allows the photographer to finally be present in group photos.


The app guides you through the process of taking two photos in sequence, first taken by the photographer, second shot where they have switched with someone in the group, and the app then merges the two photos together.

iCampsites provides a guide to more than 8,000 campsites in the UK and Europe, backed up with user reviews, pictures and GPS coordinates.



HearPlanet

The HearPlanet app provides an audio version of information from Wikipedia and its own database.



iMovie

iMovie is Apple's movie-studio-inyour-pocket that enables you to shoot and send video shorts.

Its pared-down editing suite, allows soundtracks and shot transitions to be dragged and dropped to create moving postcards.

Hipmunk Hotels & Flights compares travel sites to find the best deals on a range of services including flights, trains and accommodation.



Orient

A very simple app but one of my favorites, Orient gives you a sort of compass view of a list of locations, showing you where certain locations are in relation to you.

When you fire up the app, it shows major world cities, but to get the full benefit, try adding all the places you plan to visit during your next day trip.



Passbook

Passbook holds vouchers, tickets, boarding passes, loyalty cards etc.

You scan Passbok barcodes with the camera or add them from apps, emails and websites.

Handy for boarding passes when you have checked in on line and have no luggage to deposit.

Free apps with Passbook include Coupons, Hungry Hero (food and drink), Vouchr (lifestyle) and Ticketek (entertainment).



Packing (To Do)

Ben Bowers writes:

Coordinating what you need to bring for both short and extended trips is often an exhaustive exercise in memory and attention.

Luckily, this Packing app helps take some of the preparation stress off travelers by allowing users to create packing lists and check items off as they're packed.

Packing allows you to also view recreated sample packing lists or templates built for a variety of common trip types.



Pin Drop

Pin Drop enables you locate GPS pins onto a map when you discover something interesting, or to browse user-made lists recommending the best attractions in the area.



PinPin ATM finder

PinPin ATM finder lists the destination of ATM cash machines in 220 countries.



Packing Pro

Tell Packing Pro where you're going, how long for and who with and it'll give a suggested list of what you might need, split up into essentials (passport, currency), clothes, gadgets and more, with lists for additional family members.



PixIr-o-matic

Pixter Scanner

PixIr-o-matic is app for taking and editing pictures, with similar features to Instagram but more.

If you're traveling in a foreign country where the main language is not your first language, reading things such as traffic and transit signs can become overwhelming and quickly eat up a lot of time.

The Pixter Scanner app can snap a photo of any text you'd like and then translate it for you to any given language.

I've tried a lot of text translators and Pixter is by far one of the fastest and most accurate.



Pano

Ben Bowers writes:

Pano is an easy-to-use app that allows even novice photographers to shoot panoramas with up to 16 photos using the iPhone's onboard camera.

Simply point the camera at the desired panorama scene, and follow the app's handy semitransparent guide to help line up each shot perfectly.

From there, the software's advanced alignment, blending and colormatching algorithms do the rest of the work to create seamless images which can then be stored directly to your iPhone's photo roll.



Ready Set Holiday!

Ready Set Holiday! is a simple app that tells you how many weeks and days you have left until that next trip.





RoadNinja

Susan Kohlback writes:

RoadNinja is a great app for Road Tripping in the United States.

Users can access any highway route in the United States, tap on an exit number and see what services are available there; hotels, restaurants, gas stations, shopping, pharmacy, etc.

If you have your GPS locator activated on your phone, the app will automatically load the information for the route you are traveling on.

This app makes it simple to scan four or five upcoming exits to see which one would be best to stop at for the night, who has the most gas stations (which means competitive pricing), and where you can find your favorite restaurant chain.



The Roller Coaster Guide

Aimed at a very niche market, the Roller Coaster Guide allows riders to browse through a database of over 5,000 roller coasters with images to find out the speed and height of the ride.

The app also supports ticket booking and offers exclusive discounts daily.



Shipfinder

Martyn Best writes:

Shipfinder is brilliant for identifying local ships nearby



StanStone

Karin-Marijke writes:

StanStone is a fun, new way of keeping track of fellow travellers - where are they, what are they doing, and maybe they left a recommendation of some sorts for my next destination.



SeatGuru

SeatGuru finds the cheapest tickets and adds crucial information from seat pitch and the proximity to the toilet to the likeliness to be bumped.

It allows flight search and features a color-coded seating plan -green is a good seat and red is bad.



SkyScanner

Simon Locke writes:

SkyScanner is particularly useful for finding routing to a specific location.

For example the only direct flight from the USA to Martinique originates in Miami and one can determine the fare based on date of travel.

In this particular example it can then be used to obtain an estimate for a fare from an alternative point of origination.

Nick Spence writes:

Skyscanner is a simple app for finding and indirectly booking via the provider, cheaper flights, with the ability to search millions of flights from 1000 airlines worldwide.

Users can search by specific destination, date or, for more impulsive travel, view an interactive globe to see current 'indicative' prices.

SnapCast

SnapCast allows users to produce a 30-second, narrated video package without post-production editing.

This can be uploaded and shared on social media platforms.

Speedtest

David Dean writes:

I work online, so knowing whether the guesthouse or cafe wifi is usable before I book a room or order a coffee is important. *Speedtest* tells me in a matter of seconds.

Sunrise

Jason Z. Guest writes:

Sunrise, created by two ex-designers of Four Square, is the answer for those seeking to aggregate decentralized calendar-like content.

It delivers a beautiful interface, with intuitive, relevant icons for visual reference, incredible intuition for calendar navigation, accepts all features of Google Calendar (including their multiple calendar feature), and the app integrates the location of events with a single touch into Google Maps.







Simply Declare

Cyle O'Donnell writes:

Simply Declare calculates real-time taxes and declaration items per country when entering customs and does real-time exchange rates, suggested costs for various travel expenditures and a lot of other cool, mathematical stuff.



Tipping Bird

Rick Martin writes:

Tipping is a practice that can vary from one country to the next. Indeed in many cultures, they might not even tip at all.

The Tipping Bird app lets you select a country, and then it tells you a recommended tip for typical situations, such as in restaurants or taxis.

You can also convert the currency to your own.



Springpad

SpringPad takes the notebook to the next level by adding further details to your entries automatically.

It's handy to create a checklist for a trip, when you add entries like hotels, restaurants or landmarks, the app will save contact information, reviews, maps and pictures.



Tipulator

Tipulator is a tip calculator app to help the mathematically challenged split bills and tips while neatly sidestepping social embarrassment



Sunrise & Sunset

When traveling I always make a point to take in the sunrise and sunset in each new point across the world.

Sunrise & Sunset uses gps to give you the exact times to expect the light show.



Touchnote

Heather Cowper writes:

I use *Touchnote* often to send a postcard to my parents, especially if I'm with the family as they love to hear from their grandchildren.

It's so easy to take an iPhone photo of ourselves when we are on holiday, add a few words and then a real postcard is delivered within a few days, for about the same cost as a traditional postcard but with far less work.



Sunscreen

David Clarke writes:

Having detected the UVI rating of your current location, the Sunscreen app sets a countdown timer to alert you when you're due your next sun block.

All you have to do is input your skin type and the SPF of your lotion, then kick back and soak up some worry-free rays.



TouristEye

TouristEye helps to find the best prices and options for a trip and helps build a wish list of destinations



Telegraph travel guide

Ashley Gibbins writes:

The travel guides from the UK's Daily Telegraph are interesting and informative in equal measure.



Translate

Simon Locke writes:

Translate, based on the Google translate engine, translates words, sentences or complete paragraphs between multiple languages.

My personal experience to date has been in translating from English to Japanese, Hebrew, Spanish and Czech and it also allows translation into English from another language or between two different languages.

Once the translation has been completed it will provide a written and a auditory version of the translation.



Time Out city guides

The Time Out city guides provides a mini-guide to 20 of the world's biggest cities, with information on restaurants, bars, shows and exhibitions.





Translate Pro

Simon Locke writes:

Translate Pro is a slightly different approach since one segment of the app provides common phrases in various categories such as "bargaining", "weights and amount" and "in the restaurant" etc.

It is also possible to enter your own words or phrases to be translated on the fly. The written form is provided but in order to hear how a phrase should sound one needs to buy a language specific voice package that costs \$1.99 per language per voice.



Travel Channel Layover Guide

Allyson Kazmucha writes:

Travel Channel's Layover Guide local spots to hang out at that you may have never decided to visit. Everything from breweries to pubs to five star dining and local attractions.



TripAdvisor Offline City Guides

Micki Kosman writes:

The *TripAdvisor* offline city guides don't need an Internet connection, making it easy to find restaurants, hotels and attractions on the go.

Since the map works with your phone's GPS, you don't need to be connected to the internet to see your location on their maps.

The city guides are only available for major cities right now, but more are being added all the time.



TripCase

TripCase is another app that aims to centralise travel documentation and planning in one interface that's easy to refer to before travelling and on the trip.



TripList

TripList is the best travel application I have used, keeps me organized.



TRIPit

Joy Hilton writes:

TRIPit places all my travel and accommodation bookings plus any plans (dated) all in the one place.

It detects travel related receipts from emails and adds such bookings to the list, or you can do this manually.

A premium version informs you of such things as changes in flight times and boarding gates. You even get a reminder from them of upcoming trips!

Nicole Brewer writes:

TripIt details all of your travel plans in one place from flights, to hotels etc.

When I lost my flight details before receiving my ticket, I was able to pull up my reservation details at the checkin kiosk to proceed with check-in.

David Dean writes:

Tripit collects all of my transport and accommodation bookings live, and I use it all the time at airports, bus stations and when trying to find out where the heck I'm staying tonight.

After syncing, it doesn't need a data connection, making it even more useful in a new country.



Triposo

Triposo provides access to information on 8,000 destinations using sources from *Wikitravel* and *openstreetmap*, and is remarkably accurate.

An internet connection is not needed to access the guide and useful features include a currency converter, phrase book and active suggestions for exploration dependent on the day, weather and opening hours.

Triptease

Kirsten Alana writes :

Triptease is an essential for me on my iPad, not only for keeping track of my personal favorite hotels in a stylish way but also for finding new hotels that I want to experience during future travels.



Trover

Pete Heck writes:

Trover is designed for people to share their photos of discoveries from their travels. The app allows you to pin locations and helps travelers find unique spots to visit.





True Horizon

Ashley Gibbins writes:

True Horizon allows making photographs at the just right angle by highlighting the correct position of the camera relative to the horizon.

With the Pro Pack feature set you can even let the camera shoot automatically when the angle is correct.



TuneIn

Ashley Gibbins writes:

TuneIn lets you listen to the world's radio with music, sports, news, talk, and comedy streaming.

Of the 100,000 live radio stations and 2 million podcasts, concerts or shows it tends to be baroque in the morning, Absolute Country hits to keep me cheerful the day and Wispering Solo Piano Radio in the evenings.



Uber

Janet Fouts writes:

Always a step up from a local taxi and safer if you're in a town you don't know.

Uber drivers can find you and you pay through your phone, tip included.



Ulocal

Tucker Cummings writes:

Ulocal is a great way to get advice from locals about what makes a city great and on events, great places to eat, and all the pertinent info you need before planning a trip.

Ulocal includes in-app messaging and calling worldwide, which allows users to call foreign numbers with no charge.



Urbanspoon

Urbanspoon scans your location and finds the closest restaurants and bars with search by type, price and rating.



Viber

Martyn Best writes:

Like Whatsapp, *Viber* is a good free means of communicating with voice, text or other messages.



Waze

Simon Locke writes:

Waze is a really great mapping program that provides point-to-point navigation and interactive information about road hazards such as accidents, objects in the road, vehicles stopped on the road side, police, traffic delays.

This information is updated constantly by other individuals (Wazers) who are driving ahead of you.

It works well in the USA, Canada and Israel (3 examples) and has proved fairly reliable on major highways in Panama but some of the much smaller roads are missing.

WeatherPro

David Clarke writes:

WeatherPro is an intuitive app offering weather reports for well over two million geographical locations, feeding in everything from cloud formations and atmospheric pressure to wind speed and humidity.

WhatsApp Messenger

WhatsApp Messenger allows you to send pictures, videos, sound clips and text using wi-fi or your phone's web package to someone with the app anywhere in the world for free

Wi-Fi Finder

The *Wi-fi Finder* app provides directions to the nearest source of wireless internet.

The offline mode means you can download maps before you go to avoid unnecessary bills.

Wikipedia

Ashley Gibbins writes:

The official app of Wikipedia mindboggling encyclopedia containing more than 20 million articles in 280 languages, and is the most comprehensive and widely used reference work humans have ever compiled.

All this information in Wikipedia's trademark no-frills format – just perfect.











WikiSherpa

WikiSherpa is essentially an offline version of the Wikitravel/Wikivoyage site, and is another great tool for when you arrive in a new country and don't have a data connection.

Just pick where you're going beforehand, download the information and it'll be there when you need it.

This is a very handy application that draws a plethora of useful info about your surroundings from Wikitravel.

The display uses Augmented Reality to display annotations of nearby points of interest over the top of the regular camera display.

Forward your various confirmation emails for flights/hotels/hire cars/restaurant bookings etc. to trips@worldmate.com and the app instantly generates an itemised itinerary covering your entire trip.

If you upgrade to the premium version the app will keep you in the loop in real time, generating alerts to let you know when flights are delayed or gates change.
